

The 3 Parts in TIME ...



For a 5-Part Arrangement - add the Intro and Coda


The 3 Parts in SPACE ...

On the right, you'll see the three musical "roles" your 2-hands will play and how they correspond to the 'geographical' of the harp (i.e. where you'll play them).

While they areas overlap a little, they basically break the harp into 3rds - the lowest 3rd is for the bass line, the middle 3rd for accompaniment and the top 3rd for the melody - so whatever size your harp, you can split it accordingly.

By the way, this is true for other instruments as well, like the clarinet - it's just very easy to see on the harp because of how visible and visual the instrument is.

Each 'role' also has a distinctive sound. The Melody should ring out, the bass is often clearer when it's simple, and the accompaniment should generally be a little softer than either bass or melody.



You might think of a Hula dancer:

- Her hands are telling the story: Melody
- Her feet are moving her simply from one place to another: Bassline
- Her skirt is swishing: Accompaniment

NOTE: When starting out, leave out Accompaniment & just focus on Melody & Bassline
